2024 approved City Council priority: High Functioning, Coordinated, Quantified Approach to Homelessness with Public Updates

Proposed Plan 2024-2025

To advance the City's plan to end homelessness through 2025, the City Council will work through the Steering Committee to strengthen the coordination required to make measurable progress by:

- Unifying community's activities around the shared goal of reducing overall homelessness
- Convening key organizations and departments to streamline homelessness prevention and rehousing activities
- Mapping county, regional and state responses to homelessness and aligning those with Concord's plan
- Maintaining a comprehensive, real-time, By Name List of those experiencing homelessness
- Supporting coordinated outreach to all those experiencing homelessness
- Supporting coordinated case conferencing for all those experiencing homelessness
- Identifying community assets that can contribute to achieving the goal
- Inviting landlords and other community partners to play essential roles
- Regularly reporting to the Council and community on progress and on opportunities to assist
- Clearing barriers to progress wherever possible
- Identifying additional resources to bring into Concord to accelerate reductions in homelessness
- Improving communication to key constituents and the broader community about ongoing progress and challenges

Action Prioritization Process

- Supported by funding from the NH Charitable Foundation to NH Listens, convened city and agency leaders March 2024
 - Identified five priority aims
- Priority aims for workgroups were reviewed and ratified by the Homelessness Steering Committee in April 2024
- December 2024 MOU was completed between the City and Granite United Way (GUW) for GUW to serve as fiscal sponsor for the Steering Committee
- Currently in the process of identifying Year 1 funds for a project manager and learning collaborative meetings
- Submitted CDFA grant application for partial funding Years 2, 3

Five Priority Workgroup Aims


- Reduce overall homelessness by 80 (25%)
- Increase housing opportunities for homeless persons by 100 units
- End Veteran homelessness
- Create and implement a working model of a shared operating system for preventing and reducing homelessness
- Communicate and engage—Listen, inform and engage the community at large and key audiences about the City's strategy, progress against goals, and ways to contribute

Concord Actively Homeless Clients




Data Strengths:
