I am writing to share my enthusiastic support for the Terrill Park Improvement Project, which includes the paved Merrimack River Greenway Trail, a new dog park, new parking lots and other amenities. I was a board member of the Friends of the Merrimack River Greenway Trail for three years because I believe that a multi-purpose trail along the river would be an amazing economic and recreational resource for the city of Concord.

I would never have gone to Terrill Park if I wasn't a board member, but once there I was able to appreciate incredible views of the Merrimack River and downtown, regardless of the time of day or season. However, it doesn't feel safe to be at Terrill Park. I would go to the park to put up a Greenway Trail poster or take pictures and inevitably there would be one or more cars idling in the parking lot with a single occupant in the driver seat who avoided eye contact. Normally, I am not fazed by fellow park goers, but these gentlemen never left their vehicles and almost always left when I pulled out my camera.

There is an existing trail, but it's not great for strollers or wheelchairs and the parking lot is severely rutted. I never had any luck convincing other mothers of young children to join us for a picnic even though the lawns were always maintained and inviting.

I also have an 85 lb dog who I walk regularly in White Park and around our neighborhood. However, the only designated dog park in the city is at Terrill Park. A fenced-in dog park is a wonderful resource for dog owners who want to allow their dogs to socialize with other dogs and run sans leash without bothering other people in the area or running into traffic. Unfortunately, I do not go there often because the parking lot at Terrill Park cannot be seen from the dog park. After visiting the dog park, I wouldn't know who I would encounter in the parking lot until I was halfway down the path.

I am no longer on the board of the Friends of the Merrimack River Greenway Trail, but I will champion it forever. I believe our parks and trails create an opportunity for us to enjoy the health benefits of nature and community. A riverside, multi-use trail would connect communities in Concord and invite travellers along I-93 to stop in. I believe renovating Terrill Park would serve as a threshold to the first section of the Merrimack River Greenway Trail and provide a green space in an area of Concord that doesn't have one. I can enjoy White Park daily because philanthropic landowners 200 years ago understood the value of green space to a community. I believe Terrill Park and the Merrimack River Greenway Trail can be as much of a draw and as valuable to residents and travellers as White Park.




