On behalf of the City of Concord Parks, Recreation and Cemetery Department, I am thrilled to share our 2024 Annual Year in Review Report with you. This report highlights our initiatives, accomplishments, and the meaningful impact of our department within the community. I take immense pride in the hard work and dedication of our staff, whose commitment has been instrumental in achieving these milestones.

Our parks and facilities are vital to enhancing the vibrancy of our city. They serve as essential spaces for community building, helping to combat social isolation among individuals of all ages and backgrounds.

In our four seasonal brochures and summer camp guide, we offer hundreds of activities, programs, special events, trips, and sports leagues. CEMETERIES

The Cemetery Division is responsible for the maintenance needs of Concord's 13 cemeteries.

The cemetery staff is very dedicated to the operations and care of all those who come to the cemetery. The staff often worked seven days a week in order to keep up with weekend burials, plowing, and special events such as Memorial Day, Veterans Day, and Wreaths Across America.

This year, the Division completed the Adopt a Grave program, with a total of 686 markers placed on unmarked graves of adults and children in the "poor lot" or Common Ground in Blossom Hill Cemetery.

The division has worked 267 burials this year. That is an average of 21 burials per month.







The Cemetery Division relies on several community organizations and individuals to help prepare for Memorial Day and Veterans Day, and with the deployment of Wreaths Across America. There are more than 5,100 Veterans are buried in Concord's cemeteries.

The Horse Hill Cemetery, also known as the River Hill Cemetery, is located at the intersection of Elm Street and Penacook. The cemetery, established in 1811, sits on just about a half-acre of land and has roughly 220 burials. Horse Hill is one of the thirteen cemeteries currently maintained by the City of Concord.

One notable resident of Horse Hill Cemetery is Mr. Edward Runnells. Born on May 5, 1836 in Concord, NH. He was a very successful farmer. It is said that Edward slept every night at his home except for one week, when he attended the Centennial Exhibition of 1876, held in Philadelphia, PA. This was an Arts and Agriculture exhibit that is known to be the first World's Fair held in the United States. Mr. Runnells passed away on October 18, 1922 at his home.

Many Concord residents and visitors are familiar with the quaint chapel that sits upon the hill at Blossom Hill Cemetery on North State Street.

Susan George Perkins, a long-time resident of Concord, donated the generous gift as a memorial to her Mother, Clara Bartlett Perkins. Clara and her husband, Hamilton Eliot Perkins, were the parents of Commodore George Hamilton Perkins, whose statue stands behind the New Hampshire State House.

The chapel was designed and built by New York State Architect Marshall Francis Oliver and completed in 1904.

Immediately following the construction, the chapel was used for burial services. The use of the chapel subsided over time and it fell into disrepair. Renovations took place in 1924, 1976, 1997 and 2020. The repair in 2020 consisted of roof repairs as well as a gas heating system to replace the wood burning stove heating process. The renovation also included repairing and painting the inside of the chapel. A walkway and outside lights were added.

Many may not realize that in addition to funeral services, the chapel can be rented for a very small fee as an event space. Wedding ceremonies, celebrations of life ceremonies, christenings, Christmas events, birthday parties, etc. have all been held there. The chapel can hold 75 people with room to set up a traditional event with an altar and an organ. It has plenty of room for a non-traditional events as well.

PARKS

The story of community parks in Concord and Penacook is one of unity and heritage. The parks, many dating back to the late 1800s, hold years of memories and connections for residents. They are more than just patches of greenery or playgrounds – they represent the heartbeat of the community.

Each park is a symbol of the city's dedication to providing a high standard of living for the residents. For over a century, these green spaces have served as equalizers, accessible to all, regardless of background or status. The parks offer a safe haven for families, friends, and individuals alike. These parks are not just physical spaces; they are woven into the very essence of Concord and Penacook, nurturing a sense of belonging and togetherness among residents.

The Parks Division is responsible for the maintenance of city parks, playgrounds, athletic fields, outdoor ice skating areas, Merrimack River Greenway Trail and cross-country skiing at Beaver Meadow Golf Course.

In addition, parks staff are responsible for the mowing and trimming of the following non-park areas:

- Concord Municipal Airport (entrance areas & across the street)
- City wells
- City water towers
- Maintenance area of five rotaries: Exit 16, two on Checkerberry Lane, Manor Road, Franklin/N. State Street
- Green space at UNO's Pizzeria & Grill (Loudon Road)
- Boudreau Square in Penacook
- Supplemental mowing of Langley Parkway
- Merrimack River Greenway Trail - phase 2 (opened in 2024)

CONCORD PARKS & RECREATION PROGRAMMING

Concord Parks & Recreation offers a variety of programming throughout the year. We offer programs for children 18-months old through adulthood. Each season (roughly every six weeks) brings new program offerings.

Concord Parks & Recreation programs include, but are not limited to, youth team sports (soccer, basketball and flag football), arts & crafts, swimming lessons, summer camps, cooking classes, senior programs, nature classes, cross-country skiing, yoga, Zumba, language classes and much more.

Programs are held at multiple facilities around the city such as the City Wide Community Center, Green Street Community Center, the Penacook Library & Activity Center, the Merrimack Lodge, parks, and pools.

All programs are advertised in our quarterly brochure. Viewing our brochure is a great way to see all that we offer. The brochures are published in October, January, March and May. Each brochure looks ahead roughly three months.



SENIOR PROGRAMMING



RECREATION

Indoor community centers that fall under the department include: the City Wide Community Center (opened in June 2018), Green Street Community Center Gym, the Merrimack Lodge at White Park (opened June 2019), West Street Ward House and the City Auditorium located next to City Hall. We also run senior programming out of the Penacook Library & Activity Center (opened in December 2024).

Special thanks to the Public Properties Division of General Services as they handle the maintenance and capital improvements needs of the West Street Ward House, Green Street Community Center Gym, City Audi and the outdoor pools.

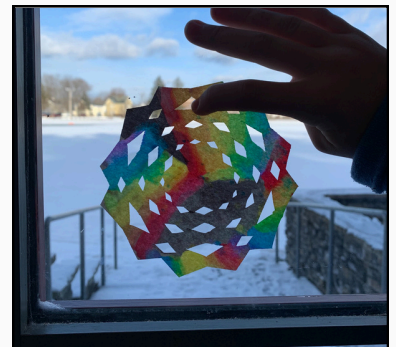

CITY AUDITORIUM (THE AUDI)

The Concord City Auditorium is a beautiful historic theater owned and held in trust by the City of Concord. The auditorium was built on the western side of City Hall in 1904. The theater house seats between 835 and 841, depending upon the configuration of the orchestra seats. The orchestra has seating for 524 to 535 guests, including nine wheelchair accessible locations. The facility hosted dance recitals, lectures, plays, pageants, symphonies, and concerts.

There are 247 seats in the front balcony and 64 second balcony seats. The space is ADA accessible, including the restrooms. The gilded proscenium arch surrounds the 25-foot by 25-foot stage performance area. There is a small orchestra pit. Backstage facilities include nine dressing rooms and three restrooms.

The Audi operation is managed in partnership with the Friends of the Audi and the City of Concord. The Friends of the Audi coordinates marketing for events, fundraises for needed capital improvement projects, and assists with trainings. There are two departments in the city that are involved: the Public Properties Division of the General Services Department handles the regular maintenance of the facility and the coordination of any capital repairs, while the Parks and Recreation Department handles the coordination of all facility rentals.

In addition to shows, house manager training was offered in September 2024 and soundboard and lightboard training was held in October 2024.



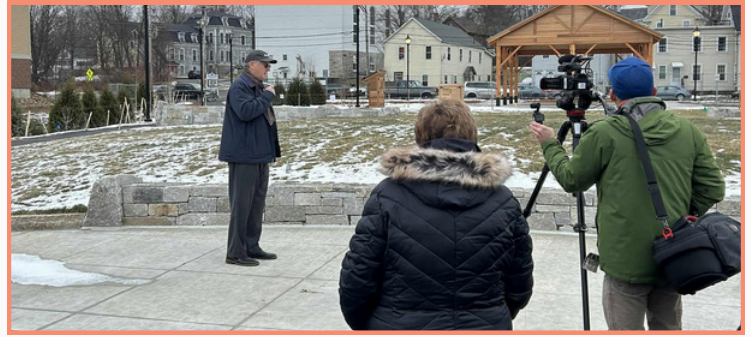

CANAL STREET RIVERFRONT PARK, PENACOOK

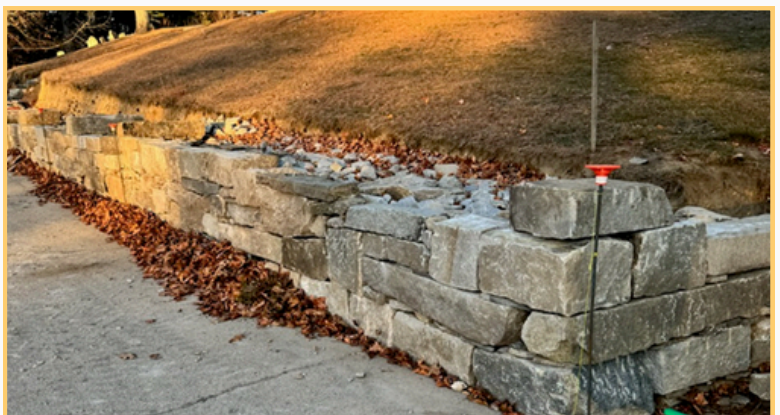
A groundbreaking ceremony was held in April and a park walk was held in December. An official ribbon cutting ceremony will be held in spring 2025.



MERRIMACK RIVER GREENWAY TRAIL - PHASE 2 OPENING

A groundbreaking ceremony was held in June and a ribbon cutting ceremony was held in September. The 3,500 foot (or 0.7-mi) paved, multi-use pathway was opened to the public.

Phase 2 includes a small parking lot, benches, shade trees, and small spur trails that will allow for access to the river's edge.



BLOSSOM HILL CEMETERY IMPROVEMENTS - WALL & VAULT (BEFORE & IN PROGRESS)

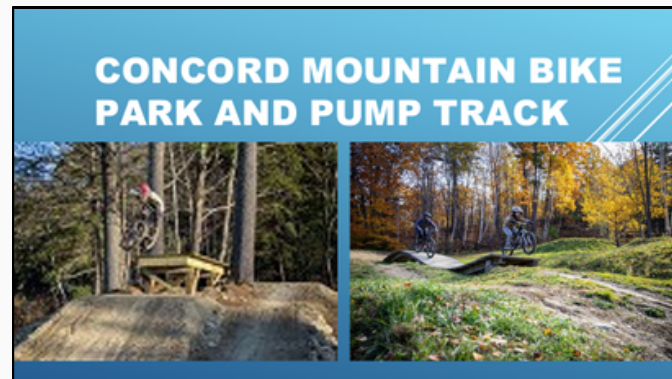
CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS (CIP)

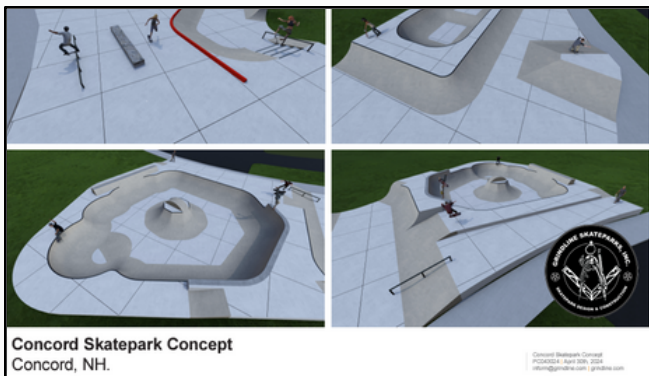

GRANTS & DONATIONS

Working with the community and our numerous partners, we have been able to raise more than half a million dollars this past year. With these private donations and grants, the department and the city continued to offer low-cost and free events to our residents as well as help offset cost of our capital projects and department initiatives.

- \$500,000 Land and Water Conservation Grant for a new skateboard park at Kiwanis Riverfront Park.
- Just over \$41,000 in donations to help provide scholarships to youth in our camps and programs, Learn to Swim Program and our Summer Concert Series. Thank you to Walker Lecture Fund, Capital City Subaru and Concord Housing + Redevelopment and all of our other donors.
- This year we were a proud recipient of the 2024 Life Jacket Program. Through a grant provided by Dartmouth Health Children's Population and Injury Prevention Department, Coast Guard approved loaner life jackets were available at all six of our public pools.
- \$18,000 grant from the New Hampshire Council for the Arts for the restoration of the Eastman Clock Tower.

We are also grateful for the more than 500+ volunteers who assisted our department with numerous contributions in 2024.
