## CITY OF CONCORD ENERGY AND ENVIRONMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE MINUTES OF JULY 2, 2020

The Concord Energy and Environment Advisory Committee met at 7:00 p.m., on July 2, 2020, virtually.

  - I. Welcome and Introductions
    - Henry has retired from taking meeting minutes
      - Jessica & Kelsey to rotate taking minutes
    - Rich intends to resign as Committee member, will stay on as volunteer

       opens up a member vacancy
    - Welcome Jessica Forrest and Nick Babladelis as new formal members

Carl moves to accept June EEAC minutes. Chuck seconds. Unanimously Approved.

- II. Solid Waste Advisory Committee (SWAC) Referral
  - General Services Department input (Jeff Hoadley, Deputy Director)
  - Referral arose from SWAC October meeting
    - o committee member brought forward idea of City ban on single use plastics
  - Application to City venues discussed
    - o City Arena
      - has concession stand that uses single use plastics
    - SWAC Chairman asked for cost estimate of switching the Arena over to compostable items would be about \$300 extra annually
  - Possible other venues/events
    - o Golf Course
    - Memorial Field
    - o Market Days
  - Uncertainty surrounding municipality's authority to implement such bans
    - bills were pending in legislature to allow such municipal-level bans, hopefully will be taken up in 2021 session
  - Rob to try to get in touch with Portsmouth Sustainability Director

- to get update on the implementation and progress of Portsmouth's ban of certain single use plastics on City property (Ordinance to officially take effect in December 2020)
- More complete financial analysis needed
  - venues beyond the Arena
  - o other venues
  - o other City departments that may have information:
    - Parks & Rec (Memorial Field)
    - Purchasing
  - is there a payback period?
- Resources & Ideas could be posted on the Committee Facebook
  - Stephanie Bretton City's communications coordinator
  - Library, Parks & Rec, General Services have their own communications coordinator
- St. Paul's made a "soft" transition to all bio-based products over the last year
  - clear bio-based plastics confuse consumers, can easily contaminate recycling bins
  - Nick created a suggested hierarchy of single-use materials for use at St. Paul's
  - Brookline, MA has good resources on plastic bans
  - Nick can get information on school's costs
  - o ultimate goal of eliminating Styrofoam, similar materials
- Does the City provide plastic bag recycling?
  - consider implementing along with plastic ban
- Consider making plastic restriction a condition for certain events
  - InTown Concord event applications
  - o permits issued by City's Code Administration
- Committee sub-group on zero waste
  - next steps: to focus on data collection from City departments and preparing financial analyses
- III. Municipal Properties Update
  - Proposed solar facility (~500kW) on Hall Street Waste Water Treatment Plant (WWTP)
    - o City Council voted to move forward in negotiations with Revision Energy
    - New report (to be made publicly available soon) contains important update:
      - City requiring the construction of an additional fence at the site
      - cost of additional fence makes the project uneconomical
    - committee working with Revision decided to remand this project to Council for consideration
    - merits of project to be discussed at July 13 City Council meeting both financials and larger policy aspects

- Possible options for moving forward
  - Revision may have alternatives to City's fence requirement
  - Project could be delayed until next year and (if net metering legislation is passed) upsized to 2MW
    - Sam points out that if project is over 500 kW, Unitil requires installation of a recloser, which would be very expensive
  - Rich: has anyone priced out storage for both WWTP and the landfill?
    - would bypass both recloser and net metering issues
    - has Beth Greenblatt looked into the possibility of City funding this themselves? (issuing municipal bonds)
    - Chuck points out that City-funded project would not get Investment Tax Credit
  - Project could be made entirely behind-the-meter
    - no net metering at all
    - WWTP is a good candidate because load is fairly predictable & constant
- Any updates on landfill project?
  - no waiting for the flexibility to be able to build a large project (ie, legislation to raise the net metering cap)
- IV. UNH Sustainability Institute Fellow (Amina Grant)
  - July 10 midterm Sustainability Fellow presentation to the Sustainability Institute
    - o 3 sessions (1 hour each)
    - o 5 Fellows/session
    - break out groups to discuss different topics
  - August 10 City Council meeting
    - Amina will have opportunity to present what the project has accomplished
  - Amina: Summary of work accomplished so far
    - soliciting & compiling data for GHG inventories
    - o not all data entered yet
    - municipality: electricity use is biggest contributor to emissions
    - community as a whole: stationary uses, specifically commercial & industrial use of natural gas
    - Until has been very helpful
      - Gary Miller has been providing lots of data
    - o Commercial businesses
      - Amina considering doing a representative sample survey of stationary fuels for electricity and vehicle fleets
      - creating survey for businesses to complete (50 100 businesses)
      - will give a better picture of where emissions coming from
    - o Schools
      - inventory won't include the colleges/universities in town
  - Next Steps

- o outlining GHG Inventory report narrative
- continuing to enter data into inventory tool
- Chuck: Do you have all of the Liberty Utilities data that you need?
  - o Yes
  - o what about fuel oil?
    - Amina working on trying to get state data and extrapolating using census data
- Data on households with solar?
  - would not be part of inventory, because solar does not contribute to emissions
  - Rob: the assessor's office recently sent out a communication regarding recent tax exemption information
  - Another option: how many people have applied for permits to install solar
    - Sam can pull a report on how many permits have been issued
- No data yet on electric retail suppliers (customers not on default service)
  - Nick: PUC publishes that information annually, and has been shared with Amina
- Amina: required to add statement regarding social justice to the report, any ideas?
  - o to meet with Matthew Thorne on July 17 to discuss ideas
  - maybe transit access, affordable housing
  - low-income working group met with the Community Action Program last fall – which culminated in planning the Weatherize Campaign (put on hold due to Covid-19)
  - may be possible to collect data on low income energy usage and energy needs
- V. New Business/Announcements
  - Any update on Community Power NH?
    - Rob: City administration is interested in the idea
    - a Community Power Group would need to be affirmatively designated by City Council
    - Committee can play a role by making recommendations, educating City administration on what Community Power is and what its benefits are
    - $\circ$  also stakeholder education
  - Ideas on filling Committee Member vacancy?
    - Chris suggests reaching out to high school environment club

Chuck motions to adjourn. Jessica seconds. Unanimously approved.
