PRIORITY: Housing First opportunities are expanded, the Concord Winter Shelter for individuals is operated successfully, and the unmet needs of homeless families in winter are assessed and addressed.

- Increased # of educational forums hosted in support of achieving a broader understanding of homelessness, (community meetings, town councils, service organizations, visit groups, faith communities.)
- Increased # of articles and op-eds focused on homelessness published in local print media, Facebook, membership organization newsletters, etc.

- Work with advocacy groups, including Housing Action NH and the NH Coalition to End Homelessness to prepare an outline/content for future forums.
- Conduct outreach to community partners to determine when and where.
- Conduct forum(s).
- Establish community-based relationships in support of scheduling community meetings.
 Schedule meetings in Concord and surrounding towns in Merrimack County, with appropriate pre-event marketing.
- Create a marketing and outreach plan focused on the plight of homelessness.

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Plan Goal V: Ensure broad representation and engagement of stakeholders in implementing the Plan to End Homelessness.

PRIORITY: Clear governance structure exists for the City of Concord Plan to End Homelessness Steering Committee.

The roles of both the Concord Coalition to End Homelessness and the City of Concord Plan to End Homelessness Steering Committee are clearly identified, and a clear governance structure for the Steering Committee exists.

- Full Steering Committee agrees upon and adopts a leadership structure
- Job descriptions are defined for leadership roles.
